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CSI's Fourth Mission to Haiti a Success

Children's Surgery International returned from a weeklong mission to Haiti at the end of September. CSI has been to Haiti four times, and three of those have been to this specific location. St. Damien's Hospital is located in Tabarre, which is a district of Port au Prince. This mission was different, however, as it was the first time we performed cleft



surgeries at the site. Past visits have focused on other types of semi-elective surgeries such as hernias and other analogous cases. We performed over 35 cleft and hernia surgeries, and hope to be back next spring to do more.

This trip was memorable on many levels for everyone; here are some of the favorite memories as recounted by team members:

"I will always remember the little guy who wanted my pack of gum. He spied it in my pocket as he was waiting for surgery. He asked me 'chike?' I had to ask how to say 'after surgery' in Creole. He was still asking as we rolled down to surgery and the anesthetic was making him sleepy; I thought for sure he would forget. We finished the case and the patient was wheeled our to recover. While prepping for the next case, I was summoned to the PACU. I went out and there was my little friend sitting up waiting for his chike! I gave him three sticks of strawberry Extra and he went up to the floor a few minutes later. I was told that he arrived with all three pieces in his mouth!"

"Working on the floor, I was filled with awe and respect as I watched parents and

children wait patiently, sometimes through long hours, for their turn to have surgery. They waited, parents sitting on hard chairs and children, especially older ones, in beds that were too small, with no complaining. They were grateful to be there, for their children to receive surgery that they may not have otherwise been able to have. Their quiet patience and deep gratitude filled me with a respect for the Haitian people that I will carry with me in practice and daily life in the states."

"The memory of Rose Caroline will stay with many of us forever. This little girl was severely undernourished but she was the happiest, most optimistic baby we met on the mission. With the successful repair of her cleft lip, the second goal became to get her some formula to take home, and teach mom the proper mixing ratios. After much effort (as

formula is a scarce commodity) the precious powdered formula arrived on the floor. A cup was mixed up for Rose Caroline and offered to her by her mother. As the cup reached her newly healed lip, Rose Caroline's beautiful brown eyes popped open and her small hand held the cup in a vise-like grip as she hungrily swallowed the formula. When her mother pulled the cup away to give her a break, Rose Caroline's little hand shot out to pull the cup back to her. We all laughed and smiled at her eagerness, happy in the knowledge that, not only had we repaired her lip, but we had provided her with nutrition that she clearly enjoyed and needed to grow and heal from her surgery."

"I will not soon forget the torrential downpour we survived and having to run in the rain and knee-deep 'puddles' back to the hospital only to find our tent submerged in the water! The memories of being soaked to the bone, along with my suitcase, backpack and books (which I am still drying out) are comical now..."

"So many good times in the OR. Singing, the 'Aha!' moment upon figuring out the 'Haiti Hernia' and of course watching the transformation as we fixed the children, knowing that we were giving them a chance to be a kid again."

Once again I had the privilege to participate in a medical mission with CSI, as we traveled to Liberia, Africa. When asked to travel with the CSI medical team to Liberia, I felt a tremendous sense of challenge and adventure. It was a wonderful opportunity to make a charitable donation and a personal opportunity to travel to a part of the world where I could make a difference in the lives of sick children.

I felt a little apprehensive during the planning process. What would it be like to spend ten days in a country afflicted by war, political instability, and poverty? CSI provided flight arrangements, visas, vaccines, and scheduling; Firestone Liberia hosted our team in a comfortable guesthouse and provided hearty meals and daily transportation; and Dan and Johnine Adomitis, our Firestone sponsors, made sure that everyone had anything they needed.

During the mission trip, I saw and did things that I never could have imagined. I was able to go into the operating room and watch CSI work side-by-side with their Liberian counter-parts. I saw another surgeon dedicate himself to urological repairs which enabled young boys to urinate properly. A third doctor provided surgeries to correct disfiguring conditions.

Although the government is years away from re-building the country, Monrovia has developed an active market place. Another day was spent visiting a home for children in Paynesville. We assisted CSI distribute medication and then cooked lunch for 150 orphans and public school children. During our visit, we got to know the kids and presented them with toys and boxes of educational materials.

I am most grateful to CSI and Firestone for the opportunity of a lifetime. The money that I donated in support of CSI's mission was secondary to the personal growth and experience that I gained through my travels as a Mission Partner. In recent years Riley has found that the fish drawings he entered in the State Fish Art Contest are getting more attention than his cartoons or caricatures ever have. His dad has them displayed at work, and co-workers have bought copies, again with the money going to Children's Surgery International. Some of his teachers at school have also requested copies. Now, Riley makes Giclee' prints of his best artwork so he can offer professional grade prints to interested folks.

Meet Our Newest Board Members

Tim Lander, MD

Dr. Tim Lander is new to the Children's Surgery International Board, but he has a long history with CSI. He is the first surgeon to join the Board since his medical practice partner, Dr. Jim Sidman, served five distinguished terms several years ago.

Tim, a graduate of the University of Minnesota Medical School, and completed residency training at the University of California in San Diego.

Among his favorite memories of those missions are experiencing a building-rocking earthquake during surgery in Arequipa, Peru, and having the opportunity to work with a multitude of skilled medical professionals from all over the United States.

Retired CSI Board member Mary Batinich remembers how creative and innovative Tim and the other medical staff were in our last mission to Peru, when our medical supplies were held up in customs and never did arrive in time for the mission. Tim and other doctors and nurses performed more than 60 surgeries on that mission, in spite of not having the latest state of the art machines and supplies. All of the patients were operated on successfully and were filled with grateful thanks after their surgeries. Always fun to work with, and incredibly skillful in the Operating Room, Tim is a favorite with the team members with whom he serves.

Some of the directions which he'd like to see CSI take are increasing the opportunities to train local surgeons and anesthesiologists in the operating room, and to continue to expand the variety of surgical procedures that CSI can offer on its missions.

CSI Board member Tom Fansler built a start-up company called Inter-Tax Company in 1995 and sold it in 2007. The company automated the GPS system to recreate vehicle activity that included routes and fuel consumption, and reported it to client companies. What used to be a manual process became an automated process, and Tom feels that there may be opportunities to help CSI using this technology. After



he sold Inter-Tax, he started a new division for Peoplenet, a leading mobile communications provider to the transportation industry.
