CSI Performs 128 Surgeries on Liberian Children

An American medical team, Children's Surgery International (CSI) has completed another working visit to the Firestone Medical Center in Duside outside Harbel.

The CSI team, which was on a similar mission early this year, arrived in Liberia on Friday, November 9, 2012, at the Roberts International Airport in Margibi County.

This was the medical team's fourth mission at the Firestone Medical Center, where in close collaboration with their Firestone counterparts, they performed 128 free surgical procedures on children who have suffered different kinds of facial and pediatric deformities.



Speaking on Friday, during a well-attended farewell program in honor of the visiting American medical team, the Administrator of the Firestone Medical Center, Mrs. Joye Collins Phillips, expressed heartfelt appreciation to the American medical personnel, their Firestone counterparts and support staff for their humanitarian gesture, according to a press release.

Mrs. Phillips had a special commendation and recognition for CSI team members and volunteers who, she said since the fourth mission started on Sunday, November 10, 2012, have worked with all their might to ensure that the mission turned out a success story.

"Thank you so much. Your presence here makes the difference in this country, makes the difference for us and I think the quality healthcare provided at our center here; that's a tremendous contribution to us and to the country so I thank you for that."

Mrs. Phillips further presented certificates of appreciation to all those who one way or the other help in making this most recent CSI mission to Liberia in general and Firestone in particular successful. She noted that words were inadequate to express her gratitude to them for the enormous sacrifices they made in the interest of the Liberian children.

For his part, the interim president and managing director of Firestone-Liberia, Mr. Patrick Rodrigo, thanked everyone who worked 'assiduously' to make the mission successful in the interest of the Liberian children and their mothers.

To the CSI team, their Liberia counterparts and support staff he said: "You have come from



far out to give this help to our children. You are helping our people, thank you very much," he added.

The chief medical officer of the Firestone Medical Center, Dr. Lyndon G. Mabande said the CSI team and all those connected with the fourth mission worked so hard to help the children of Liberia in a special way.

He further used the occasion to commend the personnel of the Firestone Medical Center for their cooperation with the CSI team whenever it came to Liberia.

In addition, Firestone Liberia is partnering with the Ministry of Health and Social Welfare and UNICEF to store and administer vaccines that help to prevent Liberians from a range of diseases. The hospital also works with the Ministry of Health for the control of HIV/AIDS, tuberculosis and malaria. Currently, they treat over 9,000 patients per month.

Dr. Lawrence Sherman of the Firestone Medical Center who coordinates CSI activities in Liberia, described the team's fourth mission as "a very successful mission."

He said: "I thank all of you who came before and have come now." The 25-member medical team which included doctors, nurses, and social workers has since departed the country.

The Clinical head of CSI mission, Katherine Houle lauded and appreciated the Management of Firestone, the Firestone Medical Center and support staff for the cooperation accorded her team. The program was graced by the presence of other senior teammates of Firestone Liberia, including the industrial relations manager, Cllr. Winleta Aynn Henries-Reeves, and the purchasing manager, Madam Lillian Mauroum, among others.

Tunisia: CSI's newest mission site

In September 2012 CSI sent a team of 8 to Tunis, Tunisia to operate on children suffering from Spina Bifida. The surgeries included correcting various spinal defects and placing shunts from the brain to the abdomen to drain cerebrospinal fluid and treat hydrocephalus. The CSI team worked with the staff at Souska Clinic, Dr. Azzedine Stombouli who is a native of Algeria who is now living and practicing in the States, and Dr. Néjib Khouja and his team who continued performing surgeries once the CSI team left.

Because these surgeries are more complicated, fewer surgeries were done than would be expected on a cleft mission; however the numbers are certainly not reflective of success. The mission was indeed a great success, partly thanks to the collaboration and partnership with Souska Clinic, and as measured by the turnout. Local Tunisian television crews broadcast the mission and the turnout included both Tunisian families and families who travelled over 1000 miles from Algeria to seek help for their children.

The hope and gratitude of patients and their families continues to be an inspiration for our missions, and there was no shortage of those sentiments here. Our thanks again to the great partnership with the clinic, doctors and staff we worked with to make this mission such a success. We would also like to thank Minnesota International Medicine and Dr. Sherif Saad for their generous support of this mission. We look forward to future collaboration with them.

Dollies Making a Difference

"I had the good fortune to be on two missions with Jan. While we were in Rangpur, Bangladesh a mother came in with a very young baby whose cleft lip and palate were preventing the baby from breast-feeding. Watching Jan quietly calm the mother while demonstrating and instructing her how to feed the baby with a syringe was a magical moment. What started as a hungry, crying baby and a distressed mother transformed in a few minutes to a happy, quiet baby and a very relieved mother. Additionally, since the baby was too young and too small for surgery, proper nourishment will allow that child to have repair work done this coming year. That's the good work that Jan routinely contributes to CSI."

The stories emulating Jan's work and service to CSI over the years are endless. It's hard to sum up the contributions of someone so influential to the organization, so we'll keep it simple: Jan, thank you for helping shape the organization CSI has become today, and for being an integral part of our mission to bring smiles to the children of the world. Mexico 2012: A Mission to Remember

Hermosillo, Mexico has been a standard mission for CSI for many years. Through a partnership with St. Andrews and CIMA Hospital, our three organizations together have changed the lives of hundreds of children, and we plan to continue traveling to this location each October as long as the need is there.

Despite the seeming routineness of this mission, the novelty of the trip and the stories that continue to inspire our work are anything but standard. Each mission features a new team, new patients, new challenges and successes, and with it new stories of hope and courage. For the participants on these missions, the stories will stay with them for a lifetime. And for those who cannot be present, we live the mission through these stories.

We encourage you to follow our blog for mission updates and to read these stories as the teams are on mission. Every mission has stories that pull at our heartstrings. Here is one particularly compelling story from this year's mission:

A young woman, age unknown, was separated from her parents as a child while trying to cross the U.S. border from Guatemala on their way to a better life in the States. Alone she spent the next several years wondering the streets, at times living with relatives. She had a facial deformity that affected looks and her speech. She eventually made her way to Mexico at the age of 13 or so and was taken in by a family in Hermosillo as a housekeeper. She had always wanted to improve her life, but due to her condition she could not speak or attend school. She came to screening alone and told no one. After evaluating her CSI determined that they could and would help her. She came through surgery beautifully and was smiling, starting to talk, and giving the thumbs up right after waking up in recovery! Her first words were "thank you" to the CSI team and all the volunteers who made this happen for her. Later in the mission she was featured on the local TV stations, and hoping to finally start school.
